Commitment to nursing education

Theresa Ball, RN, BSN, Certified Health Coach, MSN Candidate, has been with Catholic Health for the past 12 years. She was first hired at Our Lady of Consolation, transitioned to St. Charles Hospital and eventually came to Good Samaritan University Hospital, where she currently works in cardiology. She is also pursuing a Master's degree in leadership and management in nursing, thanks to Good Samaritan University Hospital's Nursing Education and Leadership Fund.

About to enter its third year of funding, the Nursing Education and Leadership Fund has provided over half a million dollars in scholarships for training, mentoring and formal education for all levels of nursing staff. Made possible by generous donors, the program has helped nearly 60 nurses and aspiring nurses to fulfill their educational ambitions and goals.

Ball first received a scholarship to become a certified health coach, and continued investing in her education by enrolling in a Master's degree program. She says, "This degree represents a brighter and more fulfilling future for me and my family. The generous scholarship I received empowered me to achieve my educational goals, equipping me with the knowledge and skills to make a meaningful impact. My vision is to continue serving as an advocate for my colleagues, offering holistic support and creating a culture of resilience and well-being within the health care profession."

Melissa Leon, RN, MSN, achieved her Master's degree at Molloy University, with help from the Nursing Education and Leadership Fund. She was a Medical Intensive Care Unit (MICU) nurse at Good Samaritan University Hospital. After graduation, she advanced to become a psychiatric nurse practitioner at Mercy Hospital. Says Leon, "I have been with Catholic Health since 2018, from unit clerk, to nurse to now nurse practitioner—and I absolutely had to continue working for the same health system that taught and helped me so much." Today, she is further investing in her career and education as she prepares to enroll in Molloy University's Post-Master's Certificate Program to become an adult-gerontology acute care nurse practitioner. She explains, "With this certification, I will be dual-certified in both psychiatry and acute care, allowing me to provide comprehensive treatment to patients across their full spectrum of needs." And because of the encouragement she received during the program, she even has her sights set on a doctoral degree in the future.

Beacon Awards for Excellence from The American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN) to recognize their excellent and compassionate care. The Beacon Award for Excellence recognizes units that distinguish themselves by providing high-quality patient care in a healthy work environment. According to Good Samaritan University Hospital President Justin Lundbye, MD, "These awards are a reflection of our MICU and CTICU/IMCU teams' consistent and systematic approach to providing rigorously researched, evidence-based care to both optimize patient outcomes and improve the work environment. In earning these awards, these units serve as international examples of excellence in clinical care and workforce satisfaction."

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Two nurses, Beth Bents, Nurse Educator, and Brianna Quinn, on 3 Main, received the 2024 DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses, and the Surgical Intensive Care Unit (SICU) received the DAISY Team Award. The DAISY Award is a special honor that celebrates the extraordinary compassionate and skillful care given by nurses every day. DAISY Award honorees personify Good Samaritan's remarkable patient experience, consistently demonstrating excellence through clinical expertise and extraordinary compassionate care.

Finally, Good Samaritan is the only hospital on the South Shore of Suffolk County to earn the most coveted and prestigious honor hospital nurses can achieve—Magnet® recognition for excellence in nursing care. The Magnet® program was created and is administered by the American Nurses Credentialing Center. It recognizes health care organizations that demonstrate excellence in nursing philosophy and practice, adhere to national standards for improving patient care, maintain an active research program and display leadership and sensitivity to cultural and ethnic diversity. Less than 10% of hospitals in the U.S. have earned the Magnet® designation.

For patients and their families, these awards signify exceptional care through improved outcomes and greater overall satisfaction. For nurses, these





international recognitions mean a positive and supportive work environment with greater collaboration between colleagues and leaders. At Good Samaritan, we are proud to support our nurses as they strive for excellence in care, every patient, every time.
